

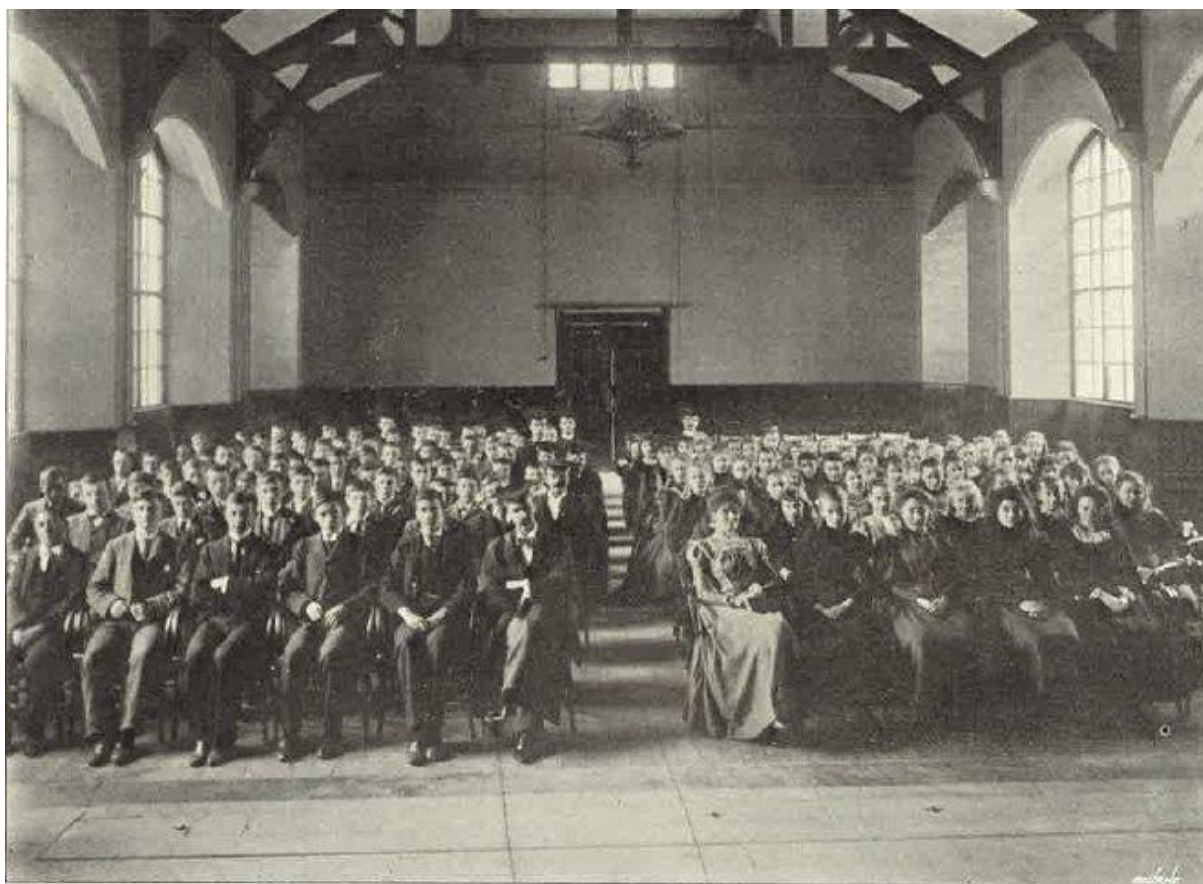

PRACTICAL CHEMISTRY LABORATORY.

General Statement.

This ancient School was founded by Grace Lady Manners in 1637, A.D., and was re-opened, in accordance with the Scheme of the Charity Commissioners, on September 24th, 1896.

The primary object of the School is to prepare Students for business life and commercial pursuits; at the same time every attention is given to the education of those who are to enter the Universities or the learned professions.

The ordinary course of Instruction includes—

Holy Scripture and the Principles of the Christian Faith.

English Subjects, (including Grammar, Geography, History, Composition, and Literature.

Mathematics:—Arithmetic, Euclid, Algebra, Trigonometry, Mechanics, Conic Sections.

Classics.

Modern Languages (French, and in special cases, German).

Science: (a) Chemistry (Practical and Theoretical).

(b) Physics (a special Practical and Theoretical Course designed to teach general knowledge of the subject, and followed by an Advanced Course in Heat).

Drawing (including Freehand, Model, Geometry, Perspective, Shading from Casts, Machine Drawing, etc.

Drill and Vocal Music.

Woodwork and the use of tools (boys).

Practical Cookery, Sewing, and Dress Making (girls).

Great stress is laid upon Arithmetic, Spelling and Handwriting. All the written work of each student is examined regularly by the Head Master.

The School has large and well-equipped Chemical and Physical Laboratories, Art Room, and Joiners' Shop.

Students assemble daily for Prayers and Roll-call in the Town Hall, which has been rented by the Governing Body owing to the rapid development of the School. The number of Students (December, 1900) is 143. (Boys, 80; Girls, 63).

There is a playing field of twelve acres, beautifully situated.

A Student may enter the School at the age of eight years, but may not remain in it beyond the end of the School Term in which he or she attains the age of eighteen.

It is hoped that Students will enter the School at an *early* age.

Application for Admission.

All applications for admission should be made to the Head Master, or to the Clerk, or to C. H. Glossop, Esq., The Bank, Bakewell.

Scholars before admission must be able to read, write from dictation, and do sums in the first four rules of arithmetic.

An examination of intending Students will be held on a date previous to the commencement of each Term. In addition to the simple subjects enumerated for examination an opportunity will be given to all Candidates to shew their knowledge of general and special subjects.

In the case of Students twelve years of age and upwards a certificate of good conduct is required, from a source satisfactory to the Head Master.

A Certificate of freedom from infection for three weeks prior to the commencement of each Term is required from all Students. Form of Certificate supplied.

A Form of Application may be had for Students seeking admission on application to the Head Master.

Scholarships, Exhibitions, and Prizes.

The following Scholarships are tenable in the School :—

A "Rutland" Scholarship (given annually by His Grace the Duke of Rutland, K.G.)

Three "Bakewell" Scholarships (awarded by the Governing Body.)

One "Rowsley" Scholarship (awarded by the Governing Body.)

Twelve "Minor" Scholarships (awarded by the Derbyshire County Council.)

The School has twice successfully competed for the "Intermediate" Scholarships (value £10—£20) and prepares for the "Major" Scholarships (value £60) of the Derbyshire County Council, as well as for Scholarships and Exhibitions tenable at Cambridge University.

The following prizes, in addition to many others, are given annually :—

The "Devonshire" Good Conduct Prize (presented by His Grace the Duke of Devonshire, K.G.)

The "Nesfield" Silver Medal for English (presented by R. W. M. Nesfield, Esq., J.P.)

The "Cavendish" Silver Medal for Mathematics (presented by Mr. Victor Cavendish, M.P.)

The "Glossop" Silver Medal for Chemistry.

School Fees.

The Day School Fees have been fixed at £2 6s. 8d. per Term per Student which sum includes the use of Books.

In case of more than two children from the same family attending the School at the same time, the third and subsequent Student's Fee is £1 13s. 4d. per term.

Fees are payable strictly in advance to the School Bankers, the Sheffield and Rotherham Bank, Bakewell. Fees form provided.

Boarding Fees are paid to the Head Master.

Regulations for Day Students.

Students coming by the down train arriving at 8.29 a.m., are in charge of a Master. They return by the 5.20 p.m. train from Bakewell. There are five compartments reserved between Belper and Bakewell.

Students are not allowed on the railway platform more than five minutes before the train is timed to arrive at the respective stations. Good conduct at the railway stations and in the train is strongly insisted upon.

During the lunch interval separate rooms are set apart for the convenience of train Students.

The School is open to Non-Bakewell Students from 4.0 to 5.0 p.m., for preparation of home-lessons. On Friday afternoons *boys* are expected to go to the playing field, and may not remain in School without special leave.

Permission to remain in School at any time apart from ordinary School hours is a privilege which will be withdrawn from Students abusing it.

The School Cap must be worn by all boys, and girls should wear the crested badge.

Train Students are not allowed to frequent the town, but may obtain occasional permission, to make purchases, etc., from the master on duty.

Students are not allowed to be in a class room, or upon the School premises unless a member of the Staff is present to maintain order.

It is expected that all Students will join the athletic clubs, and pay the small subscription per Term.

The School Games are—Boys. . Cricket, Football, and Tennis (boarders).

GIRLS. . Cricket, Hockey, and Tennis (boarders).

N.B.—Dinner is provided at the Head Master's House for Day Students requiring same, at a charge of 10d. per day, payable each half-term.

Boarding Arrangements.

There are two commodious Boarding Houses in connection with the School.

The Boys' Boarding House is also the Head Master's residence. Masters supervise home-lessons, and assist with general routine of the Boarding School.

The Girls' Boarding House is in charge of a specially appointed mistress, but Mrs. Mansford personally supervises Boarding arrangements, etc.

The Boarding Fees are inclusive, and the only other expenses of a Boarder (besides incidentals) are—

Boarders are allowed *occasionally* to attend local Concerts, etc., or to accompany the Athletic Teams, but frequent expenditure in this direction is discouraged.

A list of Boarders' requirements may be had on application.

The diet is liberal, and Boarders take their meals with the Head Master and resident Staff.

Bakewell is within a short distance of Haddon Hall and Chatsworth, in the midst of the picturesque Derbyshire Hills. Its healthy position (450 feet above sea-level) renders it especially suitable for boarders. There are through carriages on trains from London (St. Pancras), via Leicester, Derby, and Matlock, which perform the journey in about $3\frac{1}{2}$ hours, and the town is within easy reach of Sheffield, Manchester, and Buxton.

Entire charge of Colonial pupils is undertaken.

School Hours and Terms.

The hours of attendance are from 9 to 12-15 in the Morning, and from 1-30 to 3-30 in the Afternoon. In the Senior Forms Afternoon School is usually from 1-30 to 4 p.m.

There is no School on Saturday.

The School Year is divided into three Terms averaging thirteen weeks each. The holidays are arranged to come about the usual times.

It is expected that parents or guardians will see that home-lessons are carefully prepared. In the lowest Form of the School one hour should be devoted to this purpose, and in the other Forms an hour-and-a-half. The Head Master will be pleased to hear from parents who find the home-lessons in individual cases occupy longer than the required time.

A Time Table of School and Homework is supplied to each Student, a copy of which should be retained by the parent or Guardian for reference.

Students are expected to be regular and punctual in attendance. The School bell is rung five minutes before the commencement of School, when Students must be present.

Except in the case of illness, no Student may be absent from School without the consent of the Head Master being previously obtained.

Notice of Removal.

One Term's notice of removal must be given to the Head Master, *in writing*, on or before the first day of the Term or the payment of the following Term's Fees will be required.
