The School is recognised by the Board of Education as an efficient Secondary School for Boys and Girls between the ages of 8 and 19. It is a Pupil Teacher Centre, and a Centre for the Cambridge Local Examinations.

It receives an Annual Capitation Grant from the County Education Committee, who have the right of sending a number of Minor Scholars to the School.

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THE SCHOOL FROM THE BATH GARDENS.

Lady Manners School, Bakewell.

THIS ancient Grammar School was founded by Grace, Lady Manners, in 1637, and was re-opened in accordance with a Scheme of the Charity Commissioners on September 24th, 1896.

Bakewell is situated in the Peak District of Derbyshire. The surrounding country is extremely beautiful; the climate is healthy and bracing. The School buildings are some seven minutes walk from Bakewell Station, which is on the Derby and Manchester Branch of the Midland Railway.

The School is co-educational, and aims at giving to its pupils, boys and girls, an education that is a fitting preparation for the life before them. The curriculum of the School is framed in the hope that it may be of equal value to those intended for business life or agricultural pursuits, and to those who will enter the Universities or the learned professions, while every effort is made to fit the girls for home life.

The School is a day and boarding School and is open to all boys and girls of good character and sufficient health, residing with their Parents or Guardians or near relations within degrees of kindred to be fixed by the Governors, or boarding in the house of the Head Master. Children can enter at the age of eight and remain at

School until the end of the School year in which the age of eighteen is reached. On the recommendation of the Head Master, permission may be granted for pupils to remain at the School until the end of the School year in which the age of nineteen is reached.

The **COURSE OF EDUCATION** includes:—Religious Instruction in accordance with the principles of the Christian Faith; Reading and Elocution; Writing; Arithmetic and Mensuration; Algebra, Geometry, Trigonometry and Higher Mathematics; English Language and Literature; Latin and French; Physics, Chemistry, Biology and Hygiene; History and Geography; Drawing and Painting; Vocal and Instrumental Music; Physical Exercises and Drill; Woodwork and Domestic Subjects. Special attention is paid throughout the School to Writing, Spelling and Arithmetic. Greek is taught to pupils requiring it for entrance to one of the Universities. There is a special Domestic Course, which may be taken by girls in Forms VI. and VA. In special cases Book-keeping and Shorthand can be taught to those in the Upper Forms. Instrumental Music may be taught individually at a fee not exceeding £1 10s. od. per Term.

Any Parent or Guardian may claim exemption for a child from Religious Instruction or from attendance at Prayers by application *in writing* to the Head Master.

The instruction in **SCIENCE** is planned with a view to acquainting pupils with the fundamental principles of agricultural and domestic science, at the same time giving them a training in scientific method.

Special attention is paid to **PHYSICAL EDUCATION**.

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CHEMICAL LABORATORY.

The elder boys are taught Military Drill and have opportunities to learn Rifle Shooting. A Shield records the best shot of each year.

Dancing Classes for boys and girls, at an extra Fee (not exceeding one guinea for the course) are arranged during the winter months.

Time in School hours is set aside for **GAMES** and all children who are physically fit are expected to take part. A large Playing Field with Pavilion is provided. Boys play cricket and football—Girls play tennis and hockey. Parents and others interested are welcomed at Matches.

There is a School **CHOIR** of about 60 and a School String **ORCHESTRA**.

A **LIBRARY** of about 800 books is open to all.

CANDIDATES FOR ADMISSION must not be under eight years of age. A Form of Application for Admission, to be obtained from the Head Master or Bursar, must be filled in and *signed* by the Parent or Guardian of the child. The Entrance Examination is graduated according to age, but the youngest candidate should be able to read, to write from Dictation, and to work sums in the First Four Rules of Arithmetic. It is advisable that children should enter the School at an early age. There may be difficulty in placing a child of over 12 years of age in a suitable Form. The School Year begins in September, and it is desirable that children should enter then.

A **CERTIFICATE OF CONDUCT**, from a source satisfactory to the Head Master, is required in the case of all children of twelve years of age and upwards.

The Head Master is pleased to see parents at any time.

A **CERTIFICATE OF FREEDOM FROM INFECTION**, signed by the Parent or Guardian, is required at entry and at the beginning of each Term. After infectious illness or exposure to infection, a certificate from a Doctor is required, and such certificate may be required at any other time at the discretion of the School Medical Officer.

FEES. The Tuition Fee is £2 10s. 0d. per Term for children of 12 years of age and over, and £1 13s. 4d. per Term for children under 12. Where three or more children from one family attend the School at the same time the Fee for the third and subsequent child is £1 13s. 4d. per Term. A Fees Form is sent with the Report at the end of each Term. The **TUITION FEES** are payable in advance to the School Bankers, Williams Deacon's Bank, Ltd., Bakewell. For **BOARDING FEES** see page 21. The Tuition Fee includes the use of Books and all necessary Stationery and Materials with the exception of Mathematical Instruments. No other Fee is necessary except Fees for Public Examinations in the Upper Forms and the cost of Mathematical Instruments. The Text Books remain the property of the School. Any damage to School property caused carelessly or wilfully must be paid for. There is a subscription of 1/6 a Term to the General Games Fund (including Library, Magazine, &c.). It is hoped that all will be willing to pay this small subscription.

NOTICE OF WITHDRAWAL. A Term's notice, *in writing*, must be sent to the **BURSAR** before the withdrawal of any Pupil, or a Term's Tuition Fee must be paid. This rule applies to all, including the holders of Scholarships.

HOURS OF ATTENDANCE. The hours of attendance are from 8.50 to 12.30 and from 1.50 to 4.10. In the Lowest Form work ends at 12.15 and 4.0. There is no School on

Saturdays. Those children who are unable to go home in the middle of the day are required to remain, during the mid-day interval, on the School premises or on the Playing Field. Permission may be obtained to go into the Town on necessary errands.

Special arrangements are made for **PUPILS COMING BY TRAIN** each day. As far as possible, such pupils travel in reserved carriages under the charge of a Prefect. Unless special permission is obtained to do otherwise, pupils must, in all cases, proceed directly from the Station to the School and *vice versa*. After School hours the School is open for preparation of home lessons to those coming from a distance until a quarter of an hour before the time of departure of each train. Children are not allowed to be at the Station until five minutes before the departure of the train.

DINING. A limited number can be supplied with Dinner at the Head Master's house at a charge of 9d. a day. Rooms are set apart at the School for those who bring lunch. It is very desirable that the lunch should be of a substantial nature, and be brought in a suitable luncheon-case. It is not desirable that children should, as a rule, bring money to buy lunch.

The **SCHOOL YEAR** is divided into three Terms, Autumn, Spring and Summer. The **HOLIDAYS** are about four weeks at Christmas, about three weeks at Easter and six or seven weeks in the Summer. A Half-term Holiday is also given in each Term. These may be treated as Report Holidays.

EXAMINATIONS. General School Examinations in all subjects are held at the end of the Spring and Summer Terms. The senior pupils sit for the Examinations of the Cambridge Local Examination Syndicate. The School is a centre for these Examinations.

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Pupils are also prepared for University Matriculation Examinations, Open Scholarships (County or University), Examinations for entrance to the Teaching and other Professions, and for other Public Examinations.

A **REPORT** of each pupil's attendance, conduct, progress and position is sent to the Parent or Guardian at the end of each Term.

The **JOURNAL** shows the work of the pupil from day to day. Parents and Guardians are asked to inspect and sign the Journal each week.

HOME LESSONS should take half-an-hour in the lowest Forms, one hour in the middle Forms, one hour and a half in the highest Forms. It is requested that the Head Master be informed of cases in which a much longer or shorter time is taken. Assistance in Home Lessons is not necessary nor desirable. It is understood that all home-work shown up is the unaided work of the pupil.

NO PUPIL MAY BE ABSENT, except in case of illness, unless a request *in writing*, which should state the reason for the desired absence, has been made previously to the Head Master, and his consent has been obtained. Leave of absence will not be given simply for pleasure, and parents are requested not to ask for it, except in serious and exceptional cases. After any absence a letter from the Parent or Guardian must be brought stating the reason for the absence, unless leave has already been given.

The Head Master may suspend from further attendance at School any pupil who in his opinion, is exercising a bad influence in the School, bringing discredit on the School or failing to profit by its advantages.

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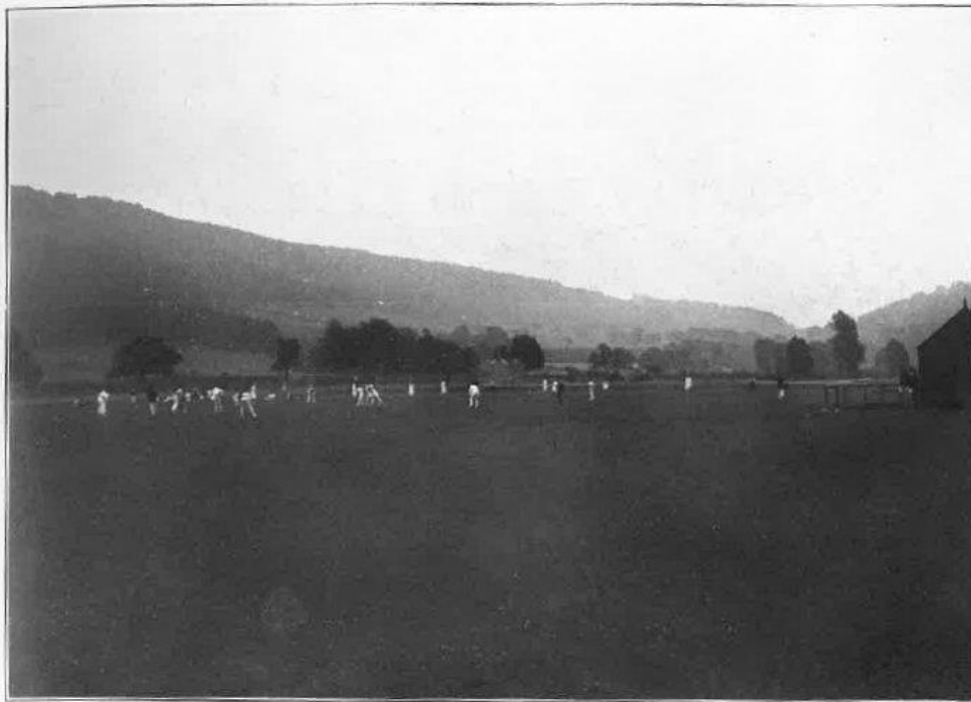


Fig. 1. School Ground.

Pupils may be detained at School from 4.10 to 4.45 for returned work. Misconduct reported to the Head Master may be punished by detention within the same hours.

School Prefects are responsible for carrying out certain duties, and have the power of reporting pupils to the Head Master. Pupils are answerable to the School for their conduct in public as well as in School.

DRESS. Every boy must wear the School cap or a straw hat with the School ribbon. Every girl must wear a straw sailor hat with the School ribbon and badge, except in bad weather, when the School cap with badge should be worn instead. The wearing of the School tie by boys and girls is encouraged. All clothes left in the Cloak Rooms must be marked with the pupil's full name.

All pupils are required to change their boots on reaching School. Shoes or slippers for use in School should be of leather and without high heels.

Boys must be provided with rubber or other suitable shoes for Physical Exercises, Football Boots, Football Knickers and Shirt, and white Cricket Flannels. The School Blazer is optional, but no other may be worn.

Girls are required to wear the School Gymnastic Dress and Shoes without heels at Physical Exercises. The Gymnastic Dress should also be worn at Games. Stout low-heeled boots with bars should be worn for Hockey.

A leather bag is necessary for the conveyance of Books. A bag to be worn over both shoulders is to be preferred.

Every pupil in Forms above the lowest must be provided with a white apron for use in Woodwork or Cooking, and a black apron for use in the Laboratory.

Scholarships, Exhibitions and Prizes.

The **RUTLAND SCHOLARSHIP**, tenable for one year, is given annually by His Grace the Duke of Rutland.

The following Scholarships are awarded by the Governors:—

(a) **GRACE LADY MANNERS SCHOLARSHIPS.** Four Foundation Scholarships are awarded on entrance to children under 12 years of age who are resident in the Townships of Bakewell or Rowsley and Alport and who are and have been for not less than two years in attendance at a Public Elementary School, with a preference as to three of the Scholarships for pupils at School in Bakewell, and as to one of the Scholarships for pupils at School in Rowsley and Alport. Vacancies are advertised as they occur.

(b) **INNER SCHOLARSHIPS.** Four Scholarships are awarded to children already in the School, who are under 12 years of age and have been in attendance at the School for not less than two years.

The Governors may award **EXHIBITIONS** tenable at some Institution of higher education.

Boarding Arrangements.

Boarders are received in the Head Master's House where they are under the immediate care of the Head Master and his wife who are assisted by an experienced House Mistress.

The children live under conditions approaching as nearly as possible to those of a healthy, well-ordered home. The house is in a sheltered position about six minutes walk from the School. It is airy and well built, and has a large garden with Tennis lawn and two vegetable gardens. A workshop for boys is provided (in addition to the School workshop), and gardens are assigned to children who undertake to cultivate them.

Boarders attend the Parish Church unless attendance at some other place of worship is desired, when the necessary arrangements can be made.

Boarding Fees are *Payable in Advance* to the Head Master.

A list of Boarders' requirements can be had on application to the Head Master.

N.B.—The Head Master wishes to point out that the sending of hampers, &c., is entirely unnecessary and undesirable.

Preparatory School.

The Preparatory School, which is under the supervision of the Head Master and his wife, has been re-organised in accordance with the latest principles, physical and mental, of child education.

Boys and Girls are admitted between the ages of four and eight; at the latter age they can enter Lady Manners School.

The hours are from 9.30 to 12.0; 2.0 to 3.30.

The subjects taught include Scripture, Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, History, Geography, Nature Study, Drawing with Coloured Chalks, Brushwork and different forms of Handwork, including modelling in paper, cardboard and plasticine, paper cutting, weaving and very simple needlework on modern lines.

A certain amount of time is also devoted to Class Singing, Physical Exercises and Kindergarten Games.

The Fee, payable in advance, is 25/- per Term.

Pupils can be supplied with dinner at the Head Master's house at a charge of 6d. a day.

The School is under the direction of Miss E. M. Lockwood, who has been trained at the Ladies' College, Cheltenham, and was temporarily on the College Staff. Miss Lockwood holds the National Froebel Union Higher Certificate; the Oxford and Cambridge Joint Board Higher Certificate; Advanced Grade R.A.M. and R.C.M.; Royal Drawing Society Full Honours Certificate.
